



### RULES:

 Entries must be postmarked no later than Monday, March 18, 2024 and addressed artistically by hand to:

- You may enter only one envelope. Size may not exceed 7x9 inches. Standard #10 business envelopes are also permitted. There is no entry fee.
- Entries must be processed and delivered through the U.S. Postal Service as First Class Mail and may not be wrapped in a separate envelope or protective covering (unless multiple entries are coming from one class).
- On the back of the envelope, print "FROM" and your name, address and email (or teacher's email). Students need to indicate their grade level.

Winners will be chosen based on artistic hand lettering, creative interpretation of the theme and effective use of color and design, including incorporation of postage stamp(s).

- 'Grades 5 to 8
- \*Grades 9 to 12

### WINNERS WILL BE NOTIFIED BY EMAIL.

Winning artists will be displayed on the guild's website in Summer, 2024. Adult winning envelopes will be displayed at **Penny Post**, a stationery and lettering arts shop in Old Town Alexandria, VA. Winning envelopes will receive publicity and certificates; Penny Post will also have customers select a "People's Choice" awardee. Receipt of entries will not be acknowledged and entries will not be returned.

### **Upcoming May 2024 workshop:**

### **Eco Printing**

Details to follow. There will be a small materials fee for the project. It was suggested that participants begin collecting and drying leaves of various trees such as: Oak/red bud/smoke bush/maple/sycamore/chestnut/ black walnut/silver dollar eucalyptus

Eco-printing is a technique where plants, leaves and flowers leave their shapes, color and marks on fabric or paper. Plant material bundled inside of cloth is steamed or boiled to release the dye found naturally inside the plant, creating a contact print in the shape of the leaf or flower used.





### **Future Months' Activities:**

The following activities are planned for the remainder of the year. The Secretary will send out "Pop-Up Announcements" as we get closer.

Feb = Gyotku (fish prints) Gyotaku is the Japanese art of fish printing. That is, catching fish, painting them with ink and pressing them against washi paper, leaving behind their imprint.





Mar = Monoline: a favorite simple one line lettering

Apr = Akim, a whimsical font

May = flourishes, to add pizazz to your work

June = annual picnic, just a fun day together!

## The Oregon State Fair returns to Salem Exposition Center August 23-September 2, 2024




