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
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



## Elements of Design Let's get into shape!

What are representational shapes?

Happy New Year! January is a great month for resolutions and one common is to get into shape. Fortunately, we are going to discuss the second element of design today, which is Shape !

We as artists are visual story tellers and we use elements of design for communication. All Letter forms are shapes and it is up to us to put these puzzle pieces together to tell an engaging story.

Shapes are two dimensional figures that are created when we enclose a line. There are two kinds of shapes: Geometric and Organic shapes.

1- Geometric shapes are human made, architectural and can be found in buildings and machines. They are precise, and regular like squares, rectangles, and circles etc.

2- Organic shapes are freeform, curvy, and have soft and round edges. They are often found in nature and are biomorphic, bio means life and morph means form, meaning life form or life like.

There are other ways to define shapes. One way is to change the color, value, texture, or pattern without drawing a line around the shape. In our Calligraphic works we can create a shape within an area by changing the font or its color. This is a useful technique to create intrigue. Shapes give us structure. They are the most important design element and our ticket to freedom and innovation. I often say 'mind your shapes and the rest will follow'.

What are positive and negative shapes?

The shapes of object that we draw are considered positive shapes and the rest of the space around the objects is considered negative shapes. The relationship between the positive and negative shapes helps us see and interpret the objects.

Our brains look for shapes and patterns. We are wired this way for survival. Early humans needed to see lions and tigers hidden in jungles for safety. Animals respond and run for cover when they see the shape of hawk or an owl when flying overhead.


#### What is The Rubin Vase?

Another interesting concept that relates to shape is the "figure-ground perception" which is also known as the classic "faces or vases" illusion. It is also called the Rubin Vase. Some people will see two profile faces in white and some will see the black vase image in the center. It depends on our perception.

What are symbolic shapes? A symbolic shape is a design or a shape that represents a complex idea, an identity or a political or religious affiliations. For example when we see a cross we think of the Christian faith. But it could also represent a highway sign or a plus sign. When we see an octagon we think of a stop sign, and stick figures represent a man or woman. The power of shapes as symbols comes from the hidden meanings that are conveyed. They can be used in politics, marketing, religions and travel Think about all the abstract images that have now become icons and they are packed with ideas and information. What do you think of when you see a triangle? could it be a mountain, or a slice of pizza? We as calligraphers have access to a wealth of symbols that can add depth and hidden meanings to our works.


they can cause distractions and make awkward areas.

One way to create a strong composition is to use the cross motif as a foundation. It never fails, get dull or boring depending on how you incorporate the rest of the design. There are many more interesting and exciting motifs which I will share in future articles.

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## **Hints and Ideas**

This is the envelope maker that Eleanor Lippman spoke about and uses to make her lovely envelopes to match her cards. You can find it at most craft stores or online.

The Envelope Punch Board is a favorite. First off, you can make your own envelopes up to size 6" x 8.5", so that's handy for a card maker. Secondly, you can make envelopes as small as  $2.5" \times 3$ ." This easy-to-use Envelope Punch works great for creating your own gift card envelopes, envelopes within envelopes and other projects. Includes a rounded corner punch. (also available in mini-envelope punch board which make envelopes as small as  $1" \times 1"$ ).



## National Handwriting Day January 23, 2021

In 1977, as educators began to feel that the art of handwriting was beginning to disappear as a requisite skill, the Writing Instrument Manufacturer's Association (WIMA) decided to do something about it. They decided that a National Handwriting Day was needed so they invented it. They chose January 23rd because that is the date when John Hancock was born in 1737. While John Hancock was a prominent merchant, a patriot of the American Revolution, statesman and even the third Governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, he is best known for being the first person to sign the Declaration of Independence. Handwriting refers to a person's unique style of writing characters created with a writing utensil such as a pen or pencil. Handwriting is separate from calligraphy or typeface.

According to WIMA's website, writing allows all of us to be individuals and artists during a time when electronic devices such as tablets, phones, and computers are the devices used as the primary form of communication. After all, handwritten letters have sparked love affairs, declared revolutions, started wars, ended wars and created whole movements. It's also an art form that is deeply embedded in our history.
