Hints and Ideas

Let's see how many new ideas we can find in this newly created section of the newsletter. Thank you to Cynthia for this wonderful submission.

CENTERING YOUR WORDS

CARD 3" wide box for words on card The middle of this box would be 1 ½"

Centering your words

The word(s) you want to put on the card is Happy Birthday . So find the middle of Happy Birthday by counting the letters and spaces 5 in the word Happy, 1 space, 8 in Birthday 5+1+8=14

..Now divide 14 by 2 $14\div 2=7$ Starting with the letter H in Happy count across to 7 including the space. Happy (5) + space (1) + B = 7 Middle of word is between the letter "B" and "i"

Happy Birthday

Now find middle of your paper space , mark it with pencil ... which would be `1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " in box below,

place the letter i on that mark to the left and finish with the remaining letters to the right.

Now write the remaining letters to the left of "irthday " in pencil the B, space, y, p, p, a, h (backwards to end at the right spot)



ppy Birthda	ау
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Voila ... your text is centered. Now try BEWARE = 6 letters $\div 2 = 3$ Middle of the word is space between W and A Put it on your paper like this Then write the rest of the letters to the left



Hope this makes sense.

If your word has odd# of letters like in the word Hello Place the first "l" on the middle mark and the rest of the letters to balance on both sides HELLO

It was a gray, dreary day when I walked out to my mailbox holding the mailbox key and hoping there were no flyers, catalogs, and political ads waiting for me, mail that goes directly into the trash can. Wouldn't it be a pleasant surprise if there was a letter from my granddaughter waiting for me or better yet, a check in the mail I had forgotten was coming.

I opened the mailbox door and there was just a single piece of mail waiting for me. Oh, well, better than nothing.

My heart skipped a beat and I could imagine the sun shining as I saw my name and address on the front of the envelope in beautifully written calligraphy. The card inside was an original, carefully constructed, a one-of-a-kind made just for me and I LOVED IT. Who said October was a boring month?

Just think, there will be many more months ahead where I open my mailbox and find sunshine and happiness waiting for me. Whoever thought up the idea of a greeting card exchange was a genius. I think I will start working on my November card now.

I became inspired by Cynthia Griffin's rock art and decided to do a series of painted rocks. Painting on rocks is an ancient art form. Our ancestors drew images of animals, carved and etched figures in caves. They kept time and marked moon cycles by etching on rock formations. They used their hand as a stencil and spit paint to create an image. The remains of the prehistoric art has influenced the modern and contemporary artists for generations.

Their symbols evoke thought and emotion. Prehistoric artists have shown us that artistic expression is a universal language and it is timeless.

During the Modern art period artists rejected all 500 years of efforts to achieve realistic effects. All the accepted measures and techniques to create classical perfection were thrown out. I am simplifying this but basically Cave paintings and primitive art gave rise to Abstraction.

Modern artists depicted figures in pure and simple flat drawings. They did not use realistic colors, and they used overlapping images and multiple perspective. The modern artists found inspiration and their core values in cave paintings and primitive art. Take a look at Picasso's Les Demoiselles d'Avignon (1907). Paul Klee, Henri Rousseau for inspiration.

Art boosts creative thinking

Art by definition is something that is produced with imagination and creativity. Studies show that art enhances problem-solving skills.
